

## Winter Brings Many Added Road Hazards; Cautious Driving Urged

**SETAF** — The advent of Winter, bringing fog, rain, frost, snow and sleet in northern Italy, will increase the difficulties of driving for SETAF motorists. Since these difficulties are caused by natural phenomena, we should accept them as a challenge to our driving skill and not as excuses for having an accident.

You can compensate for adverse road

and weather conditions by knowing and practicing these basic Winter driving techniques:

— Remember that each tire on your car has a friction area about the size of a hand. This means that snow and ice tend to reduce the effectiveness of that area and to reduce traction.

— Start and stop slowly. Reduce speed gradually and ease off the accelerator to change direction on slick surfaces.

Speed may also be reduced safely by you will be certain that you have ample space in which to stop or otherwise control of the vehicle. When starting on icy surfaces, use second or third gear.

— Adjust speed to road surface conditions, or speed of vehicles, increase following distance, and consider the weather.

— As the stopping distance increases, make by rapidly jabbing (fanning) of fast, short brake applications. Each fast, short brake application, however, requires time to stop instantaneously. The skilled driver seldom finds himself in an emergency situation.

— Use chains when driving through mud, sand, snow, slush or ice.

A few shovels of sand or earth scattered on the road surface can be much traction as chains and often more. Old burlap sacks placed under the tires of vehicles in parking lots are effective in getting needed traction when you've been immobilized.

## Time Getting Short; Hints on Christmas Card Mailing Given

**SETAF** — Christmas is 61 days away, but the 20 days left to mail your Christmas cards determine their arrival by Christmas—16 days if you send them by ship. For your convenience, SETAF postal authorities have gathered these hints on the mailing of your cards.

Christmas cards may be mailed three ways, first, third-class and annual. However, for the card to reach its destination quickly, certain requirements should be followed.

### Rates

Cards going by surface transportation, first, and third-class, should be mailed prior to November 10. If the envelope is sealed, the rate of postage is five cents per ounce. If the envelope is open for the first ounce, provided the card is unsealed and carries only a greeting and the sender's name, however, these cards are not given priority service, nor are they guaranteed.

The international first-class rate is 11 cents for the first ounce and seven cents for each additional ounce, except Mexico and Canada, where it is five cents per ounce.

Domestic airmail letter rate is eight cents per ounce. Cards mailed at this rate must be mailed prior to December 12 to insure delivery before Christmas. The international airmail rate varies, depending upon the country of address.

### Separate Cards

Patrons are requested by the SETAF postal officials to separate their cards into bundles marked APO, United States and foreign and tie them together. Stamps have been affixed in advance, cards may be placed in a single envelope without having to wait in line at the post office for service. Patrons are also requested to make maximum use of ZIP codes in their addresses.

## Italian Lt Col, New 8th Log Liaison Officer




## A Decade of Picture



As Brig Gen John M. Michael spoke last night over a series of high-wire American and Italian soldiers and Italian Carabinieri stood together in formation for the first time, "Three Flags."

As he closed his speech, Carabinieri and American military policemen, bearing three flags, approached the newly erected flag post at the head of the parade ground. They attached the flags and raised them as the 49th Army Band played the US and Italian national anthems. The flags of the United States, the Republic of Italy and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization were unfurled by the breeze and waved proudly over Vicenza's Caserna Edele.

Since that memorable day of October 25, 1955, SETAF has remained a stalwart link in the NATO chain defending western Europe. As Brig Gen Michael's command prepares to celebrate its tenth anniversary, the command has indeed met destiny over a decade of challenge and, as America's first overseas missile command, it has influenced military doctrine.

#### First Units

The first SETAF units were composed of troops of US Forces Austria, deactivated after World War II as an independent nation. This resulted left a gap in the defenses of Western Europe, since Italy is geographically, of vital strategic concern to NATO. The establishment of the American command here at the request of the Italian government was seen as a strong augmentation of the Italian forces already on guard in northern Italy.

## Steeple Placed by 'Dragon Fly'

**SETAF—**For the second time within as many weeks, the helicopter team of Capt George M. Turner, CWO Jack McKeever and Sfc Ronald R. Wilson, all from the 10th Aviation Company (Provisional), answered a call for assistance from a small village in northern Italy.

On February 12, 1961, the crew demonstrated their precision-flying ability as they placed a 26-foot high spire, topped by a cross, atop the new San Gaudioso dei Berti parish church, 10 miles south of Vicenza. The same trio air-lifted nine tons of equipment and material to support a city-sponsored project in Gallio the previous week.

Hurriedly by strong and tricky winds swirling around the Bering hills, the crew made three attempts to lower the 38-ton spire vertically in place. Success was attained on the fourth try, and Italian workmen bolted the spire in place. Assisting on the ground phase of the hook-up was Sp5 Robert R. Stephens of the same SETAF unit.

A crowd of several hundred persons from the town and nearby communities was on hand to witness the project, including Santa Ferran, the mayor of San Gottolfo; Father Benedetto Zancanato, the parish priest; Engineer Paolo Zugno, designer of the spire; and Galliano Buzzi, the contractor. The construction work was previously viewed by the Honorable Mariano Rumor, Italy's Minister of Agriculture, who resides in Vicenza.

At the conclusion of the splicing, the crowd applauded the SETAF airmen with admiration as they once again displayed their skill with the H-34 helicopter or "the dragon fly," as the Italians like to call it.

## SETAF Replies When Disaster Strikes

**SETAF—**An avalanche and tidal wave high in the Italian Alps plunged SETAF into the midst of one of the world's largest rescue missions in the past decade.

It began on the evening of October 9, 1963—an entire mountain collapsed into the still waters contained by the Vajont dam. Singing over the dam, the water swept down the valley below leaving dead and debris.

Maj Harvey Mayse, commanding officer of the 110th Avn Co, received word and immediately left by helicopter for the area at 6:30 am October 10.

#### First Reports Frightening

His first reports were frightening. From the air, he reported that thousands of people had been lost along the Piave River south of the dam. Little villages had been leveled, and there were few traces of life. The stricken area appeared like the depths of a huge crater.

#### Helicopters Dispatched

Five other helicopters were dispatched during the day, one carrying Maj Gen Hartman A. Gerhardt, SETAF CG, to the disaster site.

The Austria command, through a support element at Camp Darby, had for number of years operated a Post of Italian liaison troops from Austria began arriving on September 30, 1955 when the 350th Infantry Regiment rolled in convoy into the city of Vicenza for the second time. The Honest John rocket was SETAF's first detected weapon and its first missile unit was the 85th Artillery Battery which moved from Germany in October, 1957.

The missiles were soon joined by others and SETAF's mission was soon secure.

#### Hq Moves

In May, 1956, SETAF headquarters, which had operated from Camp Darby

late afternoon where, in a short ceremony, the keys to the post were turned over to them by Italian officials.

In May, 1956, SETAF headquarters, which had operated from Camp Darby

moved to Verona in close proximity to Allied Land Forces Southern Europe its parent Nato command. It was also closer to its combat units stationed in Vicenza.

The Corporal missile had already been added to the SETAF weapons inventory shortly before the 1st Missile Company was activated in December, 1957. With the addition of the Italian Missile Brigade in 1959, Italian artillerymen were trained in the operation of the Honest John rocket and SETAF was firmly established as a hard-hitting NATO force. More sophistication was achieved with the replacement of the

Corporal Missile by the more modern Sergeant in April, 1961.

Until January 1958, SETAF was also in command of units which were directly to Dapra, the command of its Nato affiliation was with LANDSOUTH and Allied Forces Southern Europe. When the command became a major subordinate command in US Army Europe in January 1958, it became a part of the huge US Army team serving in western Europe.

The command of the Corporal of SETAF was taken over on April 1, 1960 when 13 Italian officers were assigned to important staff positions in the headquarters.

Throughout its ten years, SETAF has been a good neighbor to its hosts in Italy and friendship has been met with friendship in the three Italian communities with SETAF in Vicenza, Belluno, and Udine. Examples of cooperation and amity among the two nationalities are legion and they make up an important part of the command's history. Some of these stories can be seen elsewhere on this page.

The future is bright for SETAF as it continues to carry out the prophecy of its first commander and moves toward its future "rendezvous with destiny."

## Fathers-to-be Get Relieved of Tension When Bat Flies In

**SETAF —**Officials at the US Army Hospital at Leghorn agreed that they had found a way to relieve the tension among expectant fathers "sweating out" the delivery back in February 1960—but long as far as is known, the hospital never repeated the process.

It happened on a 100-foot long upper corridor at the hospital when three fathers-to-be noticed a bat had invaded the hallway through an open window. Afraid the hairy mammal might escape to a ward, they yelled for help and aid from the hospital staff and the bat was quickly as possible—pursuing the bat from one end of the corridor to the other with towels, newspaper, magazines, and any other available materials.

Efforts to force the bat to escape through the opening from which it had entered failed and a battle that "lasted a good half an hour" continued until the bat was ousted.

At the American soldiers watched, more than 100 midge actors and Amazons engaged in mortal combat at one

end of the Arco di Giano while at the other two arabs of gladiators fought for their lives as the losers were thrown into flaming oil or the lions pits.

It was a unique experience for the SETAF soldiers who at the end of the filming, gave an enthusiastic thumbs-up gesture of approval to the actors and technicians of the film company.

## Twins Specially Named

**SETAF—**When Pfc Eugene Monegan came to Verona and joined SETAF's 410th Transportation Company in 1956, he was forced to leave his wife behind in Chicago as he was expecting an addition to the family soon and couldn't wait that trip.

Monegan, lonely as he was, was captivated by the charm of Verona and, at the time of expected delivery neared, decided that if the child was a girl, it should be named Verona.

A few days before Christmas, Monegan received the awaited word from Chicago that he would have a girl—was two girls? What to do now? It didn't take long for Monegan to come to a decision to name both girls Verona.

"I had a little girl," he said, "I would have named her Verona, in gratitude and honor to the town in which I am stationed. Since two girls have been born, it is natural for the other to be named Vicenza, after the town where many of my relatives are from."

The news captured the imagination of the romantic people of the two cities. The names of Verona and Vicenza Monegan were on the lips of everyone, and five days after Christmas, the mayor of Vicenza presented Monegan with a gold medallion in honor of little Verona.

## An Example of Courage

**SETAF—**An example of the courage of SETAF's Veronese neighbors and their compassion in the plight of a child occurred on a sunny day in late 1958 when an American boy was saved from certain drowning in the turbulent Adige River.

Michael Ford, 5-year-old son of Capt John Ford of the SETAF Provost Marshal's office, was playing on the banks of the river near Caserma Passalacqua when he fell into the water.

A 19-year-old student, Giuliana Molteni, was strolling by and saw the child floundering in the rapid water. She plunged into the river and tried to support him as she fought the current. At the end of the river, he was a long distance from the bank and was carried downstream. Realizing that she couldn't hold Michael indefinitely, Giuliana began calling for help.

Another passerby, Lorenzo Fazzini, a draftsman, was walking by and heard her cries. Leaping into the water, he saw that the girl had lost her grip on the boy and was being swept from her arms. Swimming to the child, he fought the current and finally succeeded in reaching shore where another man lifted the boy from the river.

The following September, the brave Italian girl and man were guests of SETAF for military honors at Caserma Passalacqua, where they were awarded scrolls signed by Secretary of Army Wilbur Brucker and Army Chief of Staff Gen Maxwell D. Taylor.

La distruzione del comando americano in Italia, su richiesta del Generale italiano, fu considerata come un appoggio alle forze italiane disteso a settentrione della penisola.

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
Il Comando USA in Austria, attraverso il suo elemento di appoggio

A causa di cattive condizioni meteorologiche, i piloti hanno dovuto ripetere le loro operazioni in ventosa, sotto eliovo, per poter deporre la preziosa guglia. Al quanto testuale essi riuscirono nel loro intento.

Centinaia di persone concepite dai dinanzi hanno segnato la difficile operazione. Tra le persone presenti, Dalmatino dei Benici, Signor Sant'Emiliano, padrone del paese, Dalmatino Zanella, Signor Gualtiero, il monsignore tempio, Architetto Padre Gianni, Signor Galliano Bacchini.

Al termine dell'operazione il pubblico presente ha volentieri applaudito i valerosi aviatori della SETAF che, ancora una volta, avevano dato dimostrazione della loro abilità nella manovra dell'H-34, l'elicottero che gli italiani amano chiamare la grande "libellula".

## Soccorsi SETAF nel disastro del Vajont

**SETAF —** Una terrificante valanga d'acqua, nelle alpi italiane, trascinò la SETAF nel bel mezzo di una operazione di soccorso tra le più vaste evereosciute nel mondo nel corso dell'ultimo decennio.

Tutto ebbe inizio la sera del 9 ottobre 1963 quando un'intera montagna piomba nelle trappole acque del lago formato dalla diga del Vajont. D'improvviso, il gigantesco flutto che segui scatenò lungo la valata provocando morte e distruzione.

Il Maggiore Harry Maxey, Comandante dell'Alfafole 110<sup>a</sup> Compagnia di Aviazione, ebbe sentore dell'incidente di Castro ed all'alba del 10 ottobre si portava, in elicottero, sulla zona della tragedia.

**Uomini e mezzi  
per salvare vite umane**

Oribili furono le parole dei suoi primi rapporti.

Da bordo del suo velivolo egli segnalò migliaia di morti senza speranza sulle rive del Fiume Piave a sud della diga. Paesi interi erano stati sparzati via dall'onda gigantesca e non vi era pressoché traccia di vita. La zona collinare appariva simile ad un alluvionato cretere lunare.

Cinquantamila soldati della SETAF erano poco tempo dopo sul posto. Provvidenziali varii reparti del comando, i militari statunitensi si unirono ai 5.000 soldati italiani inviati nella zona per le operazioni di soccorso.

Due appristati pesanti, tipo D-7,

il Generale Harrison A. Gerhardt volteiarsi sui posti.

I rapporti intanto continuavano a giungere. Essi fornivano sempre maggiore ragguardo sulle paurose proporzioni della tragedia e tutti confermavano che la catastrofe era solo l'inizio della tempesta d'aria della marea d'acqua e di sangue, avendo resistito.

Gli elicotteri poterono immediatamente essere al sicuro ed a tutta velocità che erano in pericolo per la possibilità di un ulteriore frammento del terreno.

Longarone, una cittadina di circa 1.000 abitanti, era quasi scomparsa. Villaggio e vigneti erano stati distrutti.

Un elicottero evase quaranta persone a sbarcare di poco in persona come in difficoltà a Casi, che pur trovandosi a nord del serbatoio, era stato colpito dall'onda della valanga d'acqua.

Il generale Harrison A. Gerhardt, dopo averlo sollevato, si mise a guidare verso il luogo della tragedia e dietro di lui, mentre i suoi compagni di volo lo seguivano, si dirigevano verso il luogo della tragedia.

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Due autogiri furono pure inviati per lo

sgombero delle strade nell'area colpita e rimasta isolata.

Mentre alcuni elicotteri scandagliavano il terreno alla ricerca di salvi e di possibili sopravvissuti, altri velivoli trasportavano sulle rive informanti rifornimenti di cibo e di acqua, indispensabili, e fatici in polvere che liquidavano.

Durante l'operazione di soccorso, per sette giornate consecutive, gli elicotteri dell'Espresso USA hanno trasportato 1.500 sopravvissuti, 80 salme e quasi 200 tonnellate di rifornimenti.

Una giornalista americana descrisse le sue impressioni della regione distrutta da questo terribile incidente.

«Oggi sono andato dalla terra dei vivi alla valle dei morti. Ho visto Bettino nel '45, ho visto Stoccarda, Francoforte e tutte altre città distrutte da bombardamenti; ho visto macerie e morte, ma non ho mai visto nulla che oggi ho visto io. Non ho mai visto nulla così assordante, così violento come quella che mi ha colpito sentendo nella spaventosa valle del Piave».

E fu così che gli «Angeli della Piatra» volarono verso la valle della morte — operando giorno e notte, insomni, in aiuto ai fratelli italiani rimasti senza tette, molli con i segni della tragedia sulla carne.

Il generale Harrison A. Gerhardt, che si trovava a Longarone, decise di trasferirsi a Vittorio Veneto, nella caserma Pasoldacqua, dove i suoi uomini di stanza erano già pronti per riceverlo.

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# Gen Johnson Discusses National Security in AID

Alexandria, Va. — As he goes about his round of daily duties, the average soldier little realizes the significance and extent of his contribution to the mainstream of national security. Providing an overall picture of how the Army fits into the grand strategy, Gen. Harold K. Johnson, Army chief of staff, has written "The Army's Role in Nation Building and Preserving Stability" for the November issue of the *Army Information Digest*. In the lead article, Gen. Johnson emphasizes that security of the Nation demands no less than total commitment of every Army member in countering any threat to our national interests.

## Santo Domingo

Demonstrating an actual Army operation in response to national security needs, Lt. Col. George Brinkley Jr. describes his actions in Santo Domingo. He sets forth some guiding principles and discusses lessons learned in the action that sent US troops to assist in maintaining stability.

Nowhere traditionally marks National Education Week, and to tell how the Army carries out its gigantic educational program, several articles are presented. Dr. Arvil C. Smith, director of education in The Adjutant General's office, writes on "Progress — By Degrees," telling how enlisted members are advancing their education and careers with Army support.

The Army provides graduate schooling at civilian institutions for

officer and enlisted personnel, to fill slots that demand advanced schooling, is told by Maj. David Brown, USA. The ROTC scholarship and the new ROTC two-year program that leads to an Army commission also are present-

ed in detail.

A new feature, "The Army Scene," begins in the November issue. It will be a monthly periodical to items of Army interest from Information Officers and other sources worldwide.

**This Payday****Last Chance to Give to AOC**

**SETAF** — This payday will be the last chance many will have to give to the 10th annual American Overseas Campaign. The campaign ends October 31.

Some of the agencies which will be aided in this drive previously discussed have been the United Service Organizations (USO), American-Korean Foundation, Relief Free Europe and CARE. Rounding out the nine agencies supported by the drive are the American Social Health Association (ASHA), National Recreation Association (NRA), International Social Service (ISS) and United States Service (USS) and Project HOPE.

Space prohibits us from going into complete details, each to be covered in a separate article. Many helped by cash, The USS for example aids American seamen in foreign ports bringing them health, welfare and recreational service.

The ISS is an international family and youth agency with 1,000 offices in 20 countries and special staffs in 80 others. Last year the worldwide ISS helped nearly 300,000 people.

**NRA Research**

Servicemen's children will have better playgrounds when their parents become members of the NRA. At the request of the US Army Corps of Engineers, the association is developing a manual on playground equipment layout and surfaced.

Nearly 3,500 men and women, military personnel, civilian volunteers, employees and their wives — received leadership training in institutions and workshops conducted by NRA in 1964.

Recreational opportunities don't just happen — someone must make them available. That's what NRA is for — to meet the recreation needs of American servicemen, their wives and children.

General disease, narcotic and drug abuse, commercialized prostitution, family life education, welfare, became the items of concern for the ASHA. An approximately \$569,000 was expended last year. In the same time span, ASHA received less than \$358,000. Information on its programs can be obtained by contacting the American Social Health Association, 1790 Broadway, New York, N.Y. 10019.

**Project HOPE**

Perhaps one of the best known agencies is the white hospital ship S.S. HOPE. After serving as a hospital ship, HOPE has trained more than 2,500 doctors and nurses on three continents — Asia, Africa and South America.

At the present time, HOPE has treated over 100,000 persons, performed some 5,000 major operations, vaccinated 1 million children and distributed 1 million cartons of milk.

In addition, missions continue in the countries of Turkey, where the S.S. HOPE after the floating medical center has weighed anchor. These projects carry on HOPE's legacy after the ship has gone. So far, the Good Ship HOPE has been to Indonesia and South Vietnam in Asia, Peru and Ecuador in South America and Guinea, in Africa. The 100th port of call this year is Corinto, Nicaragua in Central America. The doctors who serve HOPE do so for two months without pay and spread no propaganda — just knowledge.

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**Army Sfc Gets Chance To Fire Weapon; First in a Long Time**

**Verona** — An Army sergeant who hasn't fired a rifle since he joined the Corps came here recently and got a chance to fire the Army's new standard rifle, the M-14, last week.

Actually it was a mistake that gave him the opportunity, but Sgt. Yssias "Mike" Morales was not about to complain.

"I'd like to fire every year, but I have a medical profile that keeps me off the annual firing roster," Sgt. Morales said.

This year the profile restrictions were overlooked and Morales got his big chance.

"I think I did pretty good," Morales reported upon returning from the range. "I hit bullseye on half of my shots at 200 meters."

Fifteen years ago, Morales also didn't have to fire a weapon. But despite the profile on his combat wound incurred at the Battle of the Bulge in 1944, Morales volunteered to serve in Korea and was one of the first to march with the 24th Division in July 1950.

Once in Korea, Morales became a squad leader and remained an M-1 until November 1953. His unit had to cross the Chines into North Korea 90 miles north of the North Korean capital. Wounded on three different occasions in World War II and once by the North Koreans, he was invalidated by a Chinese gun on that date.

is too fast for road conditions. When driving, you should follow this rule: turn your front wheels in the direction of the skid. If you are unable to skid, Do not oversteer; it may throw you into a reserve skid. To maintain control, use the handbrake, accelerator and feed gas gently. Keep your foot firmly on the brake. Turn the car under control and want to stop. Turn the wheel with short, tight jabs.

Test your brakes and get the "feel" of the road surface. Don't start after a period of standing and at frequent intervals. Make frequent sharp changes. Select speeds and areas which are safe for these tests.

Remember that winter motorists (and cyclists and pedestrians) may also be driving in poor visibility. Be extra careful.

Remember that the braking distance on a wet road is 10 times greater than on a dry road.

Expect slippery road surfaces around every curve or bridge overpass made of asphalt or concrete (covered by trees or bushes) at changes from sun to shade and from dry to wet at different times during the day. Speed should be reckoned as the sun goes down.

Drive more slowly than high-beam headlights in snow or sleet. Turn headlights on in snow or sleet. Remember to reduce speed according to weather.

The glare of approaching headlights is greatest when reflected from snowy and icy roads. Turn headlights off and reduce speed when approaching oncoming traffic.

Give clear signals in plenty of time to warn other road users, when you stop, turn or change lanes. Do not be sure that the change can be made safely and that the other driver has seen you. You must have clear vision in all directions. Remove frost, sleet, snow, dirt and mud from windows and mirrors before starting. Open a window slightly to let out moisture and to check the operation of the windshield wiper and defroster.

Be sure that exhaust gases are deadly. Open a window to let out fumes from unventilated buildings or tents. Never sleep in a vehicle while driving.

Do not drink alcohol. Alcohol fumes from a running engine will reach you. During severe cold weather, take a break to determine exhaust leaks should be mated.

By remembering and heeding these tips and above all, by increased vigilance and decreased speed — you can help make "Winterize Your Driving" for maximum safety and minimum trouble! (D.S.)
